STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

Arbour House, 84 Bradford Street, is recommended for designation as being of historical, architectural and contextual significance. Arbour House was constructed in 1892-93, for Dr. E. Stone Wiggins and his wife Susie Anna Wiggins.

Arbour House was one of the earlier year-round residences constructed after the electric street car lines made Britannia Village more accessible and it was developed as a suburb of Ottawa.

It is a good local interpretation of the Queen Anne Revival Style, executed in wood. Characteristics associating Arbour House with this style include the unusual corner tower, high shingled gables with elaborate eaves, irregular plan, distinctive original window glazing patterns and surrounds.



The two and one-half storey brick veneer dwelling at 62 Sweetland is recommended for designation as being of architectural interest. Erected in 1895 by Sarah and Andrew Mitrow, the building is a pitch roof, gable end-to-the-street structure, featuring an ornate, curved portico on the front and north facades, decorative bargeboard, brick corbelling and window surrounds. The Vernacular Queen Anne style residence was owned and firstoccupied from 1986-1904 by David A. Routhier, Clerk of Records in the Patent Office. In its overall exterior appearance, the building is an excellent example of a late nineteenth century middle class dwelling in Sandy Hill, a fashionable residential neighbourhood.



The Foisey House, at 188 St. Andrew Street, is recommended for designation as being of architectural value. This one and one-half storey clapboard cladded dwelling was erected in 1859-1860 for Alexis Foisey, an early Ottawa tinsmith, who resided here until 1876. Gable side-to-the street, with matching dormers, this Vernacular Style building features a decorative tin ceiling and S-scroll newel post on the interior.

In its overall exterior appearance, the property is a rare surviving example of typical workman's housing in Lowertown from the pre-Confederation era.

LANDMARK LEGISLATION Ontario's landmark heritage buildings need landmark legislation, such as the bill that Trinity-Spadina MPP Rosario Marchese is bringing forward on Monday.

Marchese's bill aims to protect heritage buildings from demolition and assist their owners in maintaining their heritage value.

"Heritage buildings can be a strong economic asset, in communities like Stratford and Niagara-on-the-Lake, but also in Toronto, with neighbourhoods such as Cabbagetown and The Annex leading the way," said Marchese, standing in front of the Concourse, a 1928 skyscraper scheduled for partial demolition. "But some owners of heritage property don't have the resources to maintain the historic value of their buildings. That's why we need to develop a financial assistance program."

The NDP culture critic's bill would amend the Ontario Heritage Act to give municipalities the power to refuse a demolition permit to owners of designated properties. It also provides for appeal to the Conservation Review Board instead of the Ontario Municipal Board and allows for financial assistance for the owners of properties who keep the heritage aspects of their properties in good repair.

Municipalities currently may delay demolition for up to six months, but don't have the right to refuse a demolition permit.

Executive Report

Reasons Behind Recommendation

The Chateau Laurier is designated under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act through by-law 265-78. The Statement of Reason for Designation is included as Document 2 of this report.

The Chateau Laurier hotel was designed by the architectural firm of Ross and McFarlane for the Grand Trunk Railway (which was incorporated into the Canadian National Railway in 1919) and opened in 1912. The L-shaped building containing 240 rooms was expanded to 306 rooms in 1927 through the construction of an East wing. This transformed the building into its current U-shaped plan.

The current proposal would enclose the U-shape through an addition at the north end along Major's Hill Park. This addition will add approximately 159 new rooms and approximately 72 parking spaces. The design of the addition is illustrated in the elevations included as Documents 3 to 8 included with this report. The form of the addition has respected the massing, height, articulation and materials of the original building while retaining its own character. A copper standing-seam roof will continue the Chateau's historic profile and limestone will continue to be used as the principal material to face the building.

The elevations included as Documents 3 and 4 illustrate the proposed tower which marks the northeast corner of the building. It will be of a contemporary design, reflecting but not copying the other existing towers on the building. Windows on the new addition, particularly those facing Major's Hill Park, will also be slightly larger than those on the original building while remaining in alignment with those windows . The new addition will also enable the incorporation and harmonization of the existing parking garage at the north end into the new north wing of the hotel.

The proposed addition to the Chateau Laurier is recommended for approval because it is respectful of the architectural character of the original building while creating a design of interest in its own right.

Consultation

Adjacent property owners and tenants, as well as local business and community associations were notified by letter of the date of the LACAC meeting and the Planning and Economic Development Committee meeting and were provided with comment forms to be returned to LACAC. This is in accordance with City Council's public participation policy regarding alterations to heritage buildings (PDD/PPP/N&C #9).

The applicant also presented the preliminary design proposals for the proposed addition at a meeting of LACAC on June 20, 2000. The designs included with this report reflect suggestions made by LACAC.

The Ward Councillor Stéphane Émard-Chabot supports this application.



Statement of Reason for Designation

"The Chateau Laurier, at Rideau Street and MacKenzie Street, is recommended for designation as being of historical and architectural value. Erected 1908-1912 by the Grand Trunk Railway Company, and subsequently enlarged in keeping with the original architectural style, the hotel was built in the late Victorian French Chateau Style, as designed by Montreal architects Ross and MacFarlane. This was in contrast to the initial Gothic Revival proposal. The romantic attractiveness of the Chateau Style became incorporated in a series of hotels across Canada. Sir Wilfred Laurier was the first to sign the register. From 1930-1935, R. B. Bennett resided here.

Over the years, the Chateau has served as a second home for many M. P.'s and Senators, providing a dignified, hospitable and lively Ottawa residence."





West Elevation Document 5

Re: Rideau Branch Development Project

At the Ottawa Public Library Board meeting of June 27, 2000, Mr. Wit Lewandowski, developer, and Mr. George Nichols, architect of the project, made a presentation to the Board regarding their project. The Board viewed drawings and elevations and had considerable discussion. This letter is to confirm the Board's satisfaction with the arrangements to date and its support for the proposed link between the new development and the Rideau Branch Library, as well as for a proposed atrium/courtyard behind the link.

The following points were noted:

<u>Aesthetics</u>: There is sensitivity to the architectural details of the library. The new facility will echo some architectural details such as dressed stone on the base similar to the library's front entryway. Removal of the existing front ramp would allow room for benches and plants.

The Link: The link is inset and therefore does not compete with the facade of the library. Cameras are to monitor the link, thus increasing security. At present, many seniors are hesitant to visit the library because of drug and alcohol abuse and vagrancy in the area.

<u>Lighting:</u> Mr. Nichols reported that a shading study determined there would be no loss of light in the east windows of the library with the new design. There are plans to glaze the corridor to let light come through from Rideau Street.

<u>Handicapped Access</u>: The entry would provide an all-season cover, unlike the existing ramp. An electric door opener is to be installed and it is envisioned that the link could be an area where patrons could wait for Para-Transpo. At present, there are solid doors, no visual connection to see whether a vehicle is arriving and a very small inner lobby.

<u>Atrium/Courtyard</u>: Seen as a meeting/resting place for patrons and residents alike to read a book or sip coffee. At present, there is very little reading room in the branch.

Enclosed Atrium/Courtyard: The Board supports the idea in principle but will request a meeting with the Architect/Developer to ensure maximum lighting and accessibility. It is envisaged that the upper deck would have enough skylights to allow light to grow trees below.

The Ottawa Public Library Board is pleased that all concerns have been met and looks forward to the proposed enhancements to Rideau Branch.
