INTRODUCTION

This Memorandum presents the decisions of the Project Grants Allocations Review Committee pertaining to the Health Department and the Social Services Department, Project Grants for 2000.

BACKGROUND

The Health Grant Program was created in 1993 to support new and short-term health promotion projects and innovative health strategies.

Since 1991, the Social Services Department has assumed responsibility for the allocation of project grants which support creative time-limited initiatives to deal with the social issues of people on low-income.

Since 1996, one application has been used jointly by the Region of Ottawa-Carleton Health and Social Services Departments, and United Way/Centraide Ottawa-Carleton. The Ottawa-Carleton Regional District Health Council (now the Champlain District Health Council) was originally part of this process but terminated its involvement since the Ministry of Health discontinued funding for their Health Promotion grants in 1996. The purpose of this collaboration is to streamline a process that makes more sense to the funders and the community, is easy to understand, takes less time, is credible and fair, and ensures the coordination of funding to the community. Within this collaborative approach, the separate mandates, priorities, and identity of each funder have been maintained.

PRIORITIES FOR PROJECT GRANTS

Health Department Priorities

In May 1998, the Community Services Committee approved the following areas as priorities for the 1999 Health Grants Process:

- Strategies that improve health by reducing risk-taking behaviours among young people (for example: unsafe sex, excessive alcohol use, tobacco use and exposure to safety hazards), and;
- Strategies that address self-care or health enhancement behaviours among children and adults. (for example: physical activity, nutrition, medication use and reduced exposure to second-hand smoke).

These priorities were developed as a result of a community consultation process which was conducted in February 1998. A survey was distributed to 313 agencies and the response rate was 44%.

Social Services Priorities

Funding priorities were approved by Community Services Committee in June 1998 for 1999 and 2000.

Although unchanged from 1999, the priorities for year 2000 were refocused to better align with developments coming out of the Task Force On Employment, the Task Force On Poverty and Provincial Initiatives related to Homelessness and the National Child Benefit Supplement. The priorities for 2000 read as follows:

- Employment Related Initiatives
- Coping With Poverty
- Services to Ethnic and Racial Minorities and Aboriginal Groups

These priorities arise from the Social Services strategic goals 1997-99, the Poverty Funding Framework developed early in 1997 jointly with the United Way/Centraide for the funding of programs and services specifically designed to strengthen the capacity of the community to respond to poverty and to promote self-sufficiency, from the Poverty Hearings/Audiences populaires, held in October 1998 with close to 100 people living in poverty, and additional developments as described earlier.

There is a continued need for funding in matters dealing with racism and services to ethnic and racial minorities and aboriginal groups.

REVIEW OF REQUESTS

In August and September 1999, the three funders jointly requested, from the community, applications for 2000 project grants through advertisements in the three local daily newspapers and through an information flyer to community health and social services organizations.

In October 1999, representatives of the three funding organizations held sessions in both official languages to inform potential applicants on the funding process.

The closing date for submission to the 2000 Project Grant process was November 15, 1999. In total, one hundred and thirty-two (132) applications from ninety-nine (99) agencies were received. From this number one hundred and six (106) applications pertained to Health and/or Social Services.

The total requests amounted to \$3,441,048. Of this amount, \$2,822,559 was requested from Health and Social Services.

All applications to the three funders were reviewed by a joint Allocations Review Committee, comprised of:

After an orientation session, the Allocations Committee met for the equivalent of six days in the winter of 2000, reviewed all applications and made funding decisions.

Applications were reviewed in the following manner. Allocations Review Committee members were provided at the orientation session with a copy of all applications to be reviewed and a rating form for each application. After discussions during the review of applications, all individual ratings were averaged to arrive at a single common rating for each application. A final review of all ratings helped ensure that funding decisions reflected order of importance. Preference was given to projects that were new, innovative and creative, were clearly defined, realistic and cost-efficient, demonstrated the involvement of the target group in planning and implementation of the project, demonstrated collaboration or joint ventures with other agencies, and were accessible to diverse communities.

ALLOCATIONS REVIEW COMMITTEE DECISIONS

On October 25, 1995, Regional Council approved that Allocations Committee have final authority for the allocation of Regionally approved funds for Project Grants, with grant reports going to Committee and Council for information.

The Allocations Review Committee made its decisions based on the availability of \$876,981 between the three funders, of which \$260,000 was allocated by the Health Department and \$366,981 by the Social Services Department.

Due to limited funding, it was impossible to fund all applications. *Of the 106 applications reviewed pertaining to Health and/or Social Services Departments*, 26 will receive funding from the Region of Ottawa-Carleton Health Department, 26 will receive funding from the Region of Ottawa-Carleton Social Services, 25 will receive funding from United Way/Centraide Ottawa-Carleton, 1 will receive joint funding from the Region of Ottawa-Carleton Health and United Way/Centraide Ottawa-Carleton, and 2 will receive joint funding from Region of Ottawa-Carleton Social Services and United Way/Centraide Ottawa-Carleton, as outlined below. More detailed information on all applications to Health or Social Services received is found in Appendix A. Appendix B shows breakdown of requests that received funding by funding priority of Health and Social Services Departments.

United Way will be funding another 13 applications for a total of 26 grants (\$250,000). Projects not recommended for funding are found in Appendix C.

RIGHT OF RECONSIDERATION

On October 25, 1995, Regional Council approved that an optional Right of Reconsideration process be used for Regional grant programs and that reconsideration be heard by the original Allocations Committee.

OBSERVATIONS FROM THE 2000 PROJECT GRANTS ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE

The 2000 Project Grants Allocations Committee made the following observations as part of its evaluation process:

- The Project Grant funding stream is an important source of funding to try out new ideas
- The following three agencies were identified as requiring a more stable source of funding in the future:
 - Bruce House: support to residents so that they can maintain their housing units
 - At The Base Of It All - The Basement on Baseline: this project is collaborative effort between several community organizations and the private landlord to help build the strengths of individuals and the community in poverty in the Baseline/Navaho neighborhood. It is similar to a Community House except it is in a private housing complex.
 - Club hors la rue: the preventive program responds to the needs of mostly francophone youth 12 - 18 who experience difficulties in the area of isolation, addiction, poverty, violence, school drop-out, sexuality and family problems.

In the preparation of the 2001 budget estimates, the Allocations Committee observations regarding these three agencies will be considered.

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

The priorities for Social Services Project Grants arise out of the Social Services strategic goals, the Poverty Funding Framework, the Poverty Hearings/Audiences populaires, the Task Force on Poverty, the Task Force on Employment and Provincial Initiatives related to homelessness and the National Child Benefit Supplement. The Social Services three strategic performance goals are to assist clients to obtain jobs, reduce reliance of social assistance, and assist clients to meet basic needs and were developed internally. Community consultation for the development of the Poverty Funding Framework comprised of interviews with key informants, discussion groups with people on low income, meetings with community social services agencies and discussions with a reference group. Throughout the poverty hearings, close to 100 people living in poverty spoke about their difficulties and well as their strengths, their resources for coping, and their ideas for change. The Task Force on Poverty and the Task Force on Employment involved extensive collaboration with community partners.

The priorities for 2000 Health grants were established on the basis of the information received from a survey questionnaire which was distributed to 313 agencies in February 1998.

The community was also represented throughout the allocations process in that the Allocation Review Committee was made up of representatives from other funders, agency volunteers, and consumers of services.

Applicants will be involved in the evaluation of the process through a questionnaire to be sent to individual applicants once the allocations process is completed.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION

The amounts of \$260,000 by the Health Department and \$366,981 by the Social Services Department were available for allocation.

CONCLUSION

The Health Department and the Social Services Department would like to recognize the members of the Allocation Committee for their invaluable contribution in reviewing the grant applications and making decisions for funding.

The Health Department and the Social Services Department would also like to acknowledge and commend the efforts of all the community groups and agencies who applied for funds to carry on projects to improve the quality of life in Ottawa-Carleton. These include the coordination of projects in communities who are exposed to high levels of stress due to poverty and rapid changes in their community. Their generosity and vision are inspiring.
