## **PROGRAMS AND SERVICES** **TO ETHNO-RACIAL COMMUNITIES**

Note: All programs and services are offered in English and French. Some have been offered in other languages and are noted as such. We welcome community partnership opportunities to offer additional programs and services in other languages.

## **PARENT/CHILD HEALTH**

- Health promotion and information sessions with English as a Second Language groups
- Health promotion and information sharing in residential shelters
- Prenatal classes (Arabic, Chinese) in collaboration with other agencies
- Home visits
- Well Baby drop-ins and group sessions
- Referrals to Community Perinatal Advisors and other community agencies for services to women during pregnancy by trained individuals who share the same cultural background
- Written materials for pregnant women - prenatal guide in Chinese

## **SCHOOL AGE HEALTH**

- Immunization, assessment, counselling and referral services - at the Welcome Centre
- Nutrition information in schools
- Dental health education and assessment of children in special need of dental treatment
- Immunization clinics in schools, vaccine information in different languages
- Parenting classes and groups for parents attending English as a Second Language classes
- Partnerships with school communities to promote healthy lifestyles

## **DENTAL TREATMENT**

- Basic treatment and preventive dental care for children of social service clients
- Urgent dental treatment for adults receiving social services benefits

## **HEALTHY LIVING INITIATIVES:**

### **TOBACCO USE PREVENTION**

- Promotion and distribution of “Fresh Start” video, that describe the dangers of smoking and help quitting (Arabic, Cantonese)
- Tobacco fact sheets, available in Arabic, Chinese, Polish, Somali, and Spanish
- Advise and counselling clients about smoking cessation and protection from involuntary exposure to second-hand smoke
- Tobacco use prevention training for groups of multicultural health professionals
- Training for English as a Second Language teachers on tobacco use prevention
- Support tobacco prevention and cessation programs with Arab and Lebanese community

## SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION

- Substance Abuse Prevention Project for Ethno-Racial Youth: To encourage the development and delivery of substance abuse prevention projects with these communities

## HEART HEALTH

- Work through partnerships of the **Ottawa-Carleton Heart Beat Program** to prevent heart disease and promote healthy living. Activities include displays, supermarket tours, awareness of importance of CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation), special events like parades, contests, etc.
- Support for community initiatives such as smoking cessation programs, newspaper supplements, group programs, and other projects
- Information available on heart healthy living

## **WORK PLACE HEALTH**

- Work with Somerset Height Business Improvement Area (BIA) office and local businesses to develop health promotion activities
- Use the above project as a model to develop partnerships with other BIAs

## **WOMEN'S HEALTH**

- Promote awareness of early detection practices for breast cancer for women aged 50 and over
- Work with community groups and coalitions, to improve the health of women
- To promote awareness of detection practices of cervical cancer, for women in specific ethno-racial communities

## **INFLUENZA IMMUNIZATION FOR SENIORS AND ADULTS**

- Distribute influenza prevention resource materials through media (TV, radio, newspapers) and agencies that work with ethnic communities
- Distribute influenza health educational materials and Ministry of Health fact sheets in Chinese, Italian, Greek, Portuguese, Vietnamese, Arabic, Somali, Spanish, and Cambodian to Family Practice/Medical Centres
- Annual Influenza Prevention Campaign planning meeting with ethno-cultural agencies
  
- Booklet of “Senior Friendly Dentists” in Ottawa-Carleton - includes listing of dentists able to provide services in various languages
- Provide oral health group education sessions: English as a Second Language presentations (Arabic, Somali, Vietnamese) and French as a Second Language presentations (Haitian)

## **ORAL HEALTH**

## **SAFETY FOR SENIORS**

- Work with the Ottawa-Carleton Fall Prevention Coalition to develop a partnership to promote fall prevention and develop “Train The Trainer” programs

## **HEALTHY NEIGHBOURHOODS**

- Promote the use of the three Health Promotion Senior Centres by multicultural communities:
  - Billings’ Seniors’ Centre (Billings Mall) for Asian & Mid-east seniors;
  - “Owl’s Nest” at Lincoln Heights Galleria, for Italian Community;
  - “The Friendly Corner” Seniors Centre (St Laurent Mall) for all cultural groups.

## **ELDERLY IN NEED**

- Work with multicultural communities that may be interested in helping frail and elderly members
- Increase awareness of the Caregiver Program (family and friends who care for aged relatives, neighbours and friends)
- Meeting with the front line workers in:
  - Chinese community (Somerset West & Chinese Community Centre);
  - Spanish community (Ottawa West Seniors Support Services);
  - Italian community (Somerset West Community Health Centre).
- Support sessions for Spanish and Italian caregivers - “You And Your Aging Parent”

## **CAREGIVERS FOR SENIORS**

## **COMMUNITY HEALTH PROGRAMS FOR FRANCOPHONES**

- Develop health promotion activities for Francophone ethnic communities as a component to the Program's Action Plan
- Establish links with community partners such as "L'Assemblée des affaires francophones", the Council On Aging

## **TUBERCULOSIS (TB) PREVENTION AND CONTROL**

- Promotion of education, screening for infection and disease, and arranging for treatment
- Partnerships with community health centres and school boards to broaden TB screening of adult English as a Second Language students
- TB treatment program using home support workers from several ethno-racial backgrounds

## **HIV/AIDS PREVENTION**

- Education programs to prevent the spread of the AIDS virus (HIV)
- Needle exchange program for injection drug users to provide clean needles and to help arrange for treatment of the drug abuse
- Support efforts of other communities and organizations working to prevent AIDS

## **HEALTHY SEXUALITY**

Free and confidential services to control the spread of sexually transmitted diseases:

- Health education and information
- Counselling
- Testing for disease
- Treatment
- Vaccine for hepatitis B
- Contraception and family planning services

## **ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH**

- Restaurant food handler training and education
- Information on how to control pests safely in apartments
- Reduce food-borne illness and complaints about restaurants through advice, education for street cart vendors and restaurant staff and enforcement of regulations

## **HOME CARE PROGRAM**

- Provide information on the services of Home Care
- Matching clients and caregivers by language when possible
- Building partnerships with ethno-cultural communities
