ONE-TIME GRANTS - HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES**

INTRODUCTION

This information report presents the decisions of the One-Time Grant Allocations Committee pertaining to the Health Department and the Social Services Department One-Time Grants for 1997.

BACKGROUND

The Health Grant program was created in 1993 to support new and short-term health promotion projects and innovative health strategies.

Since 1991, the Social Services Department has assumed responsibility for the allocation of one-time grants which support creative time-limited initiatives to deal with the social issues of people on low-income.

In 1994, representatives of the RMO Health Department, the RMO Social Services Department, United Way/Centraide Ottawa-Carleton and the Ottawa-Carleton Regional District Health Council met to streamline and coordinate the administration of the four funders' annual grant processes. The purpose of this collaboration was to streamline a process that makes more sense to the funders and the community, is easy to understand, takes less time, is credible and fair and ensures the coordination of funding to the community. Within this collaborative approach, the separate mandates, priorities and identity of each funder has been maintained. In 1996, the Ottawa-Carleton Regional District Health Council had to terminate their involvement since the Ministry of Health discontinued funding for their Health Promotion grants.

PRIORITIES FOR ONE-TIME GRANTS

Health Department Priorities

In April 1996, the Community Services Committee approved the following areas as priorities for the 1997 Health Grants Process:

- Strategies that improve health by reducing risk-taking behaviour among young people; and
- Women's Health Promotion

These priorities were developed as a result of a community consultation process which was conducted in February 1996. A survey was distributed to 241 agencies and the response rate was 47%.

Social Services Priorities

Funding priorities as approved by Community Services Committee in April 1996 for 1997 are:

- Homelessness;
- Services to ethnic and racial minorities and aboriginal groups; and
- Initiatives which enable people on low-income to influence issues and policies which affect them (client-led advocacy).

These priorities were determined as part of the Social Services Department's three years Strategic Plan 1993-1996, in which community agencies and clients participated. They remain valid and pertinent to the community's needs in 1997 and were approved by Community Services Committee on April 19, 1996, while the renewed Departmental Strategic Plan, in process, will be utilized to determine next year's priorities.

REVIEW OF REQUESTS

In June 1996, the three funders jointly requested applications for 1997 one-time grants from the community through advertisements in local and community newspapers and through an information flyer to community health and social services organizations.

In June 1996, representatives of the three funding organizations held information sessions in both official languages to inform and clarify the new funding process to potential applicants.

The closing date for submission to the 1997 One-Time Grant process was October 1, 1996. In total, one hundred and fourteen (114) applications from eighty nine (89) agencies were received. From this number ninety three (93) applications pertained to Health and/or Social Services Departments.

The total requests amounted to \$2,959,423. From this amount \$2,624,601 were requested from Health and Social Services.

All applications to the three funders were reviewed by a joint Allocations Committee, comprised of:

The Allocations Committee met for the equivalent of five days in the fall of 1996, reviewed all applications and made funding decisions.

Applications were reviewed in the following manner. Allocations Committee members were provided with rating forms for each application to be reviewed. After discussions, all individual ratings were averaged to arrive at a single common rating for each application. A final review of all ratings helped ensure that funding decisions reflected order of importance. Preference was given to projects that were new, innovative and creative, were clearly defined, realistic and cost-efficient, demonstrated the involvement of the target group in planning and implementation of the project, demonstrated collaboration or joint ventures with other agencies, and were accessible to diverse communities.

ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE DECISIONS

On October 25, 1995, Regional Council approved that Allocations Panels have final authority with grant reports going to Committee and Council for information.

The Allocations Committee made its decisions based on the availability of approximately \$953,981 between the three funders, of which \$260,000 was allocated by the Health Department and \$441,981 by the Social Services Department.

Due to limited funding, it was impossible to fund all applications. Of the 93 applications reviewed, 19 will receive funding from RMO Health Department, 23 will receive funding from RMO Social Services Department and one (1) will receive joint funding from Health and Social Services, as outlined below. More detailed information on all applications to Health or Social Services received is found in Annex A. Annex B shows breakdown of requests that received funding by funding priority of Health and Social Services Departments.

RIGHT OF RECONSIDERATION

On October 25, 1995, Regional Council approved that an optional Right of Reconsideration process be used for Regional grant programs and that reconsideration be heard by the original Allocation Panel.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM THE 1997 ONE-TIME GRANTS ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE

The 1997 One-Time Grants Allocations Committee made the following recommendations as part of evaluation and use by next year's Allocations Committee:

- That a brief report/evaluation on the amount of funds previously received by an agency and how they were spent be made available to the Allocations Committee.
- That the Region consider a funding source other than project funding for Community Houses (a separate report addresses this recommendation).

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

The priorities for One-Time Grants arise out of the Social Services Department's three year strategic plan 1993-1996. The former Regional Social Services Committee and the community were consulted in the development of this strategic plan and funding priorities.

The priorities for 1997 Health grants were established on the basis of the information received from a survey questionnaire which was distributed to 241 agencies in February 1996.

The community was also represented throughout the allocations process in that the Allocations committee was made up of representatives from other funders, agency volunteers, and consumers of services.

Applicants will be involved in the evaluation of the process through a questionnaire to be sent to individual applicants once the allocations process is completed.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATION

The amounts of \$260,000 by the Health Department and \$441,981 by the Social Services Department were available for allocation for 1997.

CONCLUSION

The Health Department and the Social Services Department would like to recognize the members of the Allocations Committee for their invaluable contribution in reviewing the grant applications and making decisions for funding.

The Health Department and the Social Services Department would also like to acknowledge and commend the efforts of all the community groups and agencies who applied for funds to carry on projects to improve the quality of life in Ottawa-Carleton. These include the coordination of projects in communities who are exposed to high levels of stress due to poverty and rapid changes in their ethnocultural composition. Their generosity and vision are inspiring.
